COMMITTEE ACTIONS

The committee approved the following bill drafts as committee bills that will be introduced in the 2017 legislative session:

- LCCF11, eliminating certain Department of Public Health and Human Services advisory councils and reports;
- LCCF12, requiring Medicaid reimbursement of drug therapy management provided by clinical pharmacist practitioners; and
- LCCF5a, creating and funding a grant program for training volunteers to provide respite care to people with Alzheimer's disease or other dementias.

The committee reviewed and requested changes to:

- LCCF6a, increasing the number of home and community-based waiver slots for elderly people and increasing the reimbursement rates for assisted living; and
- LCCF7b, establishing a working interdisciplinary network of guardianship stakeholders and a grant program for public guardianship.

The committee reviewed and will take final action in August on:

- LCCF4a, appropriating \$1.5 million to the Area Agencies on Aging to provide specific services related to Alzheimer's disease and other dementias;
- LCCF08, requiring guardians to report suspected exploitation of their wards to DPHHS;
 and
- LCCF02, requiring certain individuals in the financial industry to report suspected financial exploitation of people under a guardianship to the securities commissioner. The committee also asked that a panel presentation be arranged to discuss the bill in more depth in August.

The committee decided against pursuing LCCF3a, to grant funds to a nonprofit organization to facilitate the delivery of Alzheimer's services in Montana.

The committee also:

- approved draft findings for the Senate Bill 418 study of legislative mental health investments and made recommendations for future legislative or agency action; and
- agreed to review in August a bill draft to be developed by two committee members for the House Bill 422 study.
