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## **INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW**

The Children, Families, Health, and Human Services Interim Committee (Committee) is one of seven interim committees established in law and required to meet between the end of one regular legislative session and the beginning of the next. State law sets out the duties and responsibilities for interim committees, as follows:

- conducting interim studies as assigned;
- proposing bills and resolutions the committee believes should be presented to the next Legislature; and
- reviewing administrative rules, programs, and legislation for agencies within the committee's jurisdiction.

The Legislative Council assigned two studies to the Committee for the 2011-12 interim:

- House Joint Resolution 8, a study of childhood hunger in Montana; and
- Senate Joint Resolution 30, a study of childhood health trauma.

The Committee also is responsible under state law for monitoring the Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS), the largest agency in state government.

This work plan details the interim study and the agency oversight duties assigned to the Committee this interim, which effectively runs from June 2011 through August 2012. The work plan also discusses other activities the Committee may undertake. The work plan includes:

- a matrix to help the Committee determine the level of involvement it would like to have in both its interim study responsibilities and its DPHHS oversight duties, beginning on Page 9;
- a list of topics for which the Committee may want additional information during the interim, beginning on Page 11; and
- a proposed schedule of activities for each Committee meeting, beginning on Page 13.

## **INTERIM STUDY ACTIVITIES**

At its May 13, 2011, meeting, the Legislative Council assigned the following study resolutions to the Committee:

- HJR 8, which requires a study of childhood hunger in Montana. The study resolution suggests that the Committee review existing programs that seek to reduce hunger, examine and recommend ways that communities and organizations may identify gaps in their services and work together to close the gaps, and consider policies that may reduce childhood hunger, encourage public-private partnerships, and raise awareness about ways to reduce hunger.
- SJR 30, which requires a study of promising and evidence-based practices for the prevention of childhood trauma. The study resolution suggests that the Committee compile data on the prevalence of childhood traumatic stress, evaluate the effectiveness of current trauma prevention and mitigation efforts, identify communities most in need of such efforts, and identify steps that policymakers may take to reduce childhood trauma.

Separate draft study plans outline the proposed activities for each study.

A third highly ranked study of ways to make the Medicaid program more cost effective and efficient was not assigned to an interim committee. Instead, the Legislative Council decided that the key elements of that study would be covered by the House Bill 642 study of efficiency in government. The HB 642 study will be conducted by a select committee.

**Action Items:** (1) *Discuss the assigned studies and the proposed study plans.* (2) *Determine the amount of Committee time to devote to each study, using the matrix provided in Appendix A.* (3) *Determine whether to schedule time for reports to the Committee on aspects of the HB 642 study related to Medicaid or DPHHS.*

## **AGENCY OVERSIGHT**

The Department of Public Health and Human Services has more than 3,100 employees throughout the state and is responsible for providing public health services to all Montanans. It also offers a wide array of assistance to vulnerable Montanans, including children and the elderly, needy, disabled, abused, neglected, or mentally ill.

The department is organized into 11 divisions and operates six different institutions:

- the Montana Developmental Center in Boulder, which serves developmentally disabled individuals with high-level needs;
- the Montana State Hospital at Warm Springs, for adults with mental illness who are ordered to receive evaluations or treatment there;

- the Montana Chemical Dependency Center in Butte, an inpatient treatment center for adults who have been diagnosed as having an addiction to drugs or alcohol or who suffer co-occurring addiction and mental illness;
- the Mental Health Nursing Care Center in Lewistown, a long-term care facility for people who have a mental disorder, require a level of care that is not available in a community setting, and who cannot benefit from the treatment services available at the State Hospital; and
- the Eastern Montana Veterans' Home in Glendive and the Montana Veterans' Home in Columbia Falls, for veterans and their spouses who need skilled, intermediate-level nursing care or who suffer from Alzheimer's disease.

The Committee has several duties, set out in 5-5-215, MCA, in fulfilling its oversight responsibilities for DPHHS. Each of these duties is discussed below.

### **Rule Review**

The Committee's legal staff routinely reviews and summarizes DPHHS rulemaking notices and will provide the Committee with information on proposed and adopted rules, with particular attention to any rules considered to be out of compliance with legislative intent. The Montana Administrative Procedure Act (MAPA) allows interim committees to:

- obtain an agency's rulemaking records, to review them for compliance;
- submit written recommendations to the agency for the adoption, amendment, or rejection of a rule;
- require that a rulemaking hearing be held;
- participate in proceedings; and
- review the conduct of administrative proceedings.

**Action Item:** *The Committee should decide the level of involvement it would like to have in the rule review process, using the matrix provided in Appendix A.*

### **Program Monitoring**

The Committee is required to monitor DPHHS operations with specific attention to:

- identifying issues likely to require future legislative action;
- identifying opportunities for improving the existing laws governing the agency's operation and programs;

- determining whether experiences that Montanans have had with the agency may be improved through legislative action;
- reviewing proposed agency legislation; and
- reviewing other materials relevant to the Committee's oversight of DPHHS.

**Action Item:** *The Committee should decide the level of oversight and review it would like to provide for DPHHS activities, using the matrix provided in Appendix A.*

**Required Reports**

DPHHS and other agencies are required by law to present various reports to the Children and Families Committee. The 2011 Legislature approved bills requiring reports on the following topics this interim:

- the preservation needs for any DPHHS-owned heritage properties (SB 3);
- DPHHS efforts related to the Parents as Scholars Program that is available to Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) recipients (SB 385);
- the number and types of complaints filed with the Board of Medical Examiners over physician practices in providing written certification for use of marijuana for a debilitating medical condition (HB 82);
- the costs and benefits of creating a statewide database of health insurance claims filed by all insured Montanans, based on an analysis conducted by the state Insurance Commissioner and an advisory committee (HB 573); and
- how health insurance companies treat cancer patients who are eligible for clinical cancer trials (HB 615). The state Insurance Commissioner is to conduct the study and provide the Committee with a report; the Committee is to consider whether legislation is needed to ensure equitable treatment of cancer patients involved in clinical trials.

In addition, DPHHS is required to provide continuing reports to the Committee on:

- the out-of-state placement of children with mental health needs;
- the use of the children's system of care account, which was created in 2007 to pay for services to at-risk children in the least restrictive and most appropriate setting; and
- the suicide reduction plan that is to be developed each biennium as part of the suicide prevention program authorized by the Legislature in 2007.

Staff will schedule presentations on these and any other required or relevant reports into

the Committee's regular meetings as the reports are completed.

### **Review of Draft Legislation**

The interim committee process allows for an early review of agency-requested legislation. Interim committees typically authorize the drafting of many state agency bills in advance of the November election. This process frees up time for the Legislative Services Division to concentrate on legislator bill draft requests after the election. Agency bills drafted as a result of this process must be introduced before the 2013 legislative session begins and are usually among the first bills scheduled for hearings.

State agencies typically submit their legislative proposals to the Governor's Office for review and approval by June 2012, although the bills often are not fully drafted at that point. The Committee will review the proposals at its June or August 2012 meeting.

### **OTHER INTERIM MONITORING**

The 2011 Legislature passed two bills that will require the Committee to extend its usual agency oversight responsibilities.

- SB 423 revises the laws related to use of marijuana for debilitating medical conditions. The bill specifically requires the Committee to monitor the marijuana registry program operated by DPHHS and other matters related to the new law. It also requires the Committee to identify issues that may need future legislative attention and develop legislation for the next regular session of the Legislature.
- HB 142 requires all interim committees to review the statutorily established advisory councils and required reports of the agencies they oversee to determine whether any of the councils or reports should be eliminated.

The Committee will need to devote a portion of at least one meeting to the review required under HB 142 and may decide to allocate more time to the review, if desired.

The Committee may want to devote time at each meeting for the SB 423 monitoring, in large part because the law:

- makes numerous changes to the 2004 initiative that allowed for the medical use of marijuana;
- is currently being challenged on constitutional grounds in state district court; and
- is the subject of an initiative attempt to place the law on the 2012 ballot for approval by voters and to suspend the law until that vote takes place.

Staff will provide the Committee with updates and schedule presentations as requested to allow the Committee to fulfill the oversight duties required under HB 142 and SB 423.

**Action Items:** *(1) Discuss and determine the amount of time to devote to the HB 142 and SB 423 requirements, using the matrix provided in Appendix A. (2) Discuss the Committee's preferred approach to these oversight duties.*

If time allows, the Committee may also undertake additional activities to follow health and human services issues, as noted below.

### **Ongoing Issues of Interest**

The Committee may want to receive periodic written or oral updates on topics that were the subject of recent legislation or on issues that may emerge during the interim. In addition, the 2011 Legislature passed SJR 26, which identified issues that the joint appropriations subcommittees believed warranted interim monitoring. The Legislative Fiscal Division will be reviewing those items, and the Committee may want to follow up on reports completed by the Division that are related to DPHHS.

A list of topics that the Committee may be interested in following is provided in Appendix B, beginning on Page 11. The list gives a short description of the topic and the reason it was included on the list; it also provides room for other ideas from Committee members.

**Action Items:** *(1) Discuss the list of topics and determine what type of activity, if any, the Committee would like to pursue for each item. (2) Determine whether to add other topics to the list.*

### **Member Issues**

At any time during the interim, members may seek additional information from staff or other parties on issues that fall within the Committee's jurisdiction. These may be issues brought up by constituents, issues that are emerging in Montana or other states as items of concern or interest involving health and human services, or any other items that members would like to review.

If the full Committee is not interested in pursuing an item, an individual Committee member may submit a research request. Under rules adopted by the Legislative Council, a staff member may work a maximum of 16 hours on a research request that is not included in the Committee's work plan, unless the presiding officer of the interim committee approves additional research time.

### **Staff Recommendation for Additional Activities**

Committee staff will keep tabs on DPHHS issues, as well as other health and human service issues that may be of interest to the Committee. Staff will periodically provide informational material for the Committee's review and consideration.

## **MEETING SCHEDULE**

Following is a tentative meeting schedule for the interim that proposes 10 meeting days, including the organizational meeting. If the Committee forms any subcommittees, money must be allocated from the budget to cover those costs, and the number of meeting days for the full Committee may be reduced, as a result.

Committee members may change the dates or the number of meetings, within the budget, to better reflect their wishes for the interim.

Appendix C, beginning on P. 15, provides an overview of the suggested activities for each of the meeting dates.

**TIME ALLOCATION**

The CFHHS Work Plan Decision Matrix on Pages 9 and 10 provides a list of the Committee's duties, with options for the level of involvement that Committee members would like to have with each topic. The options with asterisks would result in a breakdown of Committee time approximately as follows, assuming 72 hours of meeting time.
