MSU-Billings Economic Study Points

- \$9 BILLION: Total economic impact
- 12,000 TOTAL JOBS
 - 4,500: Direct jobs
 - 7,500: Indirectly supported jobs
- Economic impact of an additional 1 million barrels of oil produced
 - 86 Full time positions
 - \$18.5 million in labor income
- A 10% increase in drilling activity could lead to 315 additional jobs.

Industry Economic Impacts 2009

- ◆ 0.7% of MT's Jobs
- ◆ Three-Times MT's Average Annual Wage (with Benefits)
- ◆ One-Eighth of MT's Total Value Added
- ◆ 4,600 Employees in Exploration, Production, or Refining
- ◆ Average Annual Refining Wage: \$91,000
- ◆ \$1.7 Billion Upstream, \$8.2 Billion Refining

Refinery Production

- 8.2 Million Gallons of Products per Day
 - 40% Distributed in Montana
 - 60% Exported to 7 Other States
- Value of Oil and Gas Extracted \$1.9 Billion

Fuels Production

- ◆ Value of Refined Products Produced \$7.3 Billion
- ◆ 50% of the total Manufacturing Production
- ◆ 10% of the total Industrial Production

Glendive

- Water
 - With minor changes can produce 7MGD. Currently highest days around 3.5 MGD-Plant is sized for more production
 - #2 is currently where City water main ends-12” main
 - City hire engineering firm to develop model of where water could go with existing infrastructure
 - Talk of placing water line up Highway 16 which will allow for development within #3 including north of the highway
 - City has constructed a separate bulk water station north of the interstate in an attempt to keep truck traffic off City streets

Glendive

- Wastewater
 - EPA and DEQ requiring changes to future discharge permits requiring major changes to the wastewater treatment system.
 - The City has just completed a PER and it appears that a treatment plant will be required at a cost of \$7 to \$9 million dollars
 - Current populations of the City requires approximately 800,000 to 900,000 gallons of discharge
 - County is also faced with a similar problem and is currently in the PER process
 - Engineer estimates indicate that a City County plant would need to be sized at 1.2 MGD
 - City looking at separate discharge station with separate analyzer for Man Camps, etc
 - Big question is do we build for anticipated growth and how much extra do we build

Glendive

- Land use issues
 - Numerous land use issues are arising
 - Dept. of Commerce bringing in people to help with land use issues
 - Discussions on annexations and zoning
 - Discussions surrounding whether or not to allow Man Camps in City Limits

Sidney Public Schools

- Enrollment increases
 - 2011-2012: 101 new students (K-8)
 - Projected: 741 new students due to residential developments
- K-12 Staffing Concerns (certified and classified)
 - 37 of 93 staff eligible to retire under TRS
 - 10-15 new staff projected for 2012-2013 school year
 - Affordable Housing
- Academic Impacts: sharp increases in Special Education and Title I students
- Budget Concerns
 - Direct State Aid and incurred enrollment increases—monetary relief is one year out due to funding structure
 - Flexibility with Oil and Gas Revenue between districts-Elementary/High School
