Purpose

- The Transit Section administers and manages funding programs of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and limited state transit funds.
- Staff allocates funds from various program sources and assists grantees to ensure compliance with the laws and regulations associated with the use of these funds.



Transit History

- 2005-2015 (SAFETEA-LU & MAP-21)
 - o 9 Rural Systems
 - 3 Small Urbanized Systems (Great Falls, Missoula, Billings)
 - o Approx. \$2M in rural operating funds
 - o Approx. \$2.6M in urban operating funds
 - o Approx. \$400K in rural and urban capital funds*

2016 (FAST-ACT)

- o 37 Rural Systems
- 3 Small Urbanized Systems (Great Falls, Missoula, Billings)
- o Approx. \$10.2M in rural operating funds
- o Approx. \$4.3M in urban operating funds
- Approx. \$3M in rural and urban capital funds*





Transit Performance

- SFY 15 Transit Performance Data
 - o Annual Ridership 4,569,327*
 - o Annual Mileage 9,804,064*

Bus and Bus Facilities

- Since 2010, MDT has purchased 273 public transportation vehicles for communities around Montana.
- MDT has provided funding for 20 bus facilities in the state.
- MDT currently has 202 public transportation vehicles on lien by the state.



Transit Programs

- Section 5311 (\$10.2M)

 Rural Operating funds for systems with populations less than 50K.
- Section 5310 (\$870K) Transportation for Elderly and Persons with Disabilities.
- Section 5307 (\$4.3M) Small Urbanized Operating funds for systems with population of 50K – 200K.
- Section 5339 (\$2.1M)

 Bus and Bus Facility
- Section 5303/5304 (\$542K) Planning
- TransADE (\$750K*)

 Transportation Assistance for the Disabled and Elderly



TransADE



- Transportation Assistance for the Disabled and Elderly – MCA 7-14-112
 - Effective Date January 1, 2016
 - Provides operating and/or matching funds for services that serve the elderly and disabled to expand and/or meet unmet needs.
 - 25% of the revenue collected on the base rental charge for rental vehicles.
 - Legislation added tribal governments and urban transportation districts to already eligible counties and incorporated cities
 - Legislation requires coordination of services through participation with a local Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC)
 - Funding is used as match to leverage more federal funds and provide additional service.
