For FFY 2010, DDS will process 8,018 initial claims, 1,065 Continuing Disability Reviews; 2,049 Reconsideration Appeals and other claims for a total of 11,400 claims.

To date the DDS has processed 6,716 applications; 4,711 initial claims, 506 Continuing Disability Reviews, and 1,332 Reconsideration Appeals.

LFD COMMENTS: The data indicates an increase of 8.2 percent growth from 2009 to 2010. Montana and surrounding states believe the increase is due to "baby boomers" looking for ways to retire on full benefits at age 62, and companies going out of business during the recession. For example, workers from the logging and mining industries that have lost their jobs are now filing for disability

The national average is up about 7 percent for the same time period. North and South Dakota statistics are up 10 and 17 percent respectively, and Wyoming is up 21 percent. Idaho is actually down 7 percent.

This program is federally funded. While it is possible that there may be a need to increase staff if caseloads continue to rise, there would be no impact on the general fund.
