





Montana school districts serve about 145,000 students in 824 schools and graduated 9,474 students in 2014.



Enrollment peaked in the mid-1990s, but is growing again as of 2012.




A district's finances are accounted for in over 20 different funds which are funded by varying blends of local, state, federal, and private dollars.



These district funds are either budgeted or non-budgeted. This pie chart shows the relative size of each of the budgeted funds.


Special Revenue Funds: Budgeted FY15

Local, State and Federal Shares




This chart shows revenues for all school funds




A school district's largest fund, for general operations, is called the general fund and is made up only of local and state dollars.
